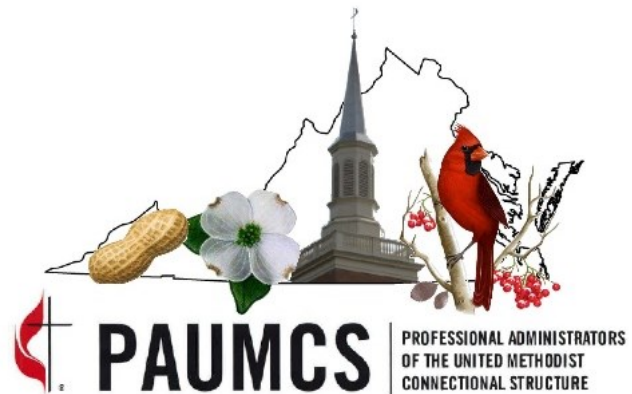

Our acronym will stay the same, but it will now signify our new name: Professional Administrators of the United Methodist Connectional Structure. Online Certification Training Evonne Dickey & Donna Grannan

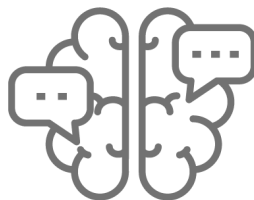
Last year, Donna and I had the opportunity to participate in the first online certification program through what was then called the Professional Association of United Methodist Church Secretaries. We have both been in our respective positions for a while and felt this was the time to take this next step in our journey. We found the online opportunity had both positive and negative impact on the training.

The information provided during the course is helpful and informative. For those who were not raised in the United Methodist Church and even those who were, portions of this course really helps explain our connectional-ism, our history, and even information on finances. At the end of the course you will also do a group project using the information you have learned throughout this course. This does sometimes test your patience as your group members could be in different time zones and also have busy schedules. It really challenges how well you can work with others.



Following the class and after processing all that took place, we found a few areas that could be improved upon. One area would be the release of course materials for all the lessons. However, since this was the first online class, we understood they were still working on the requirements to make the course material a valuable teaching resource for

everyone. Another area that made taking this certification online difficult was trying to juggle multiple balls at once. For most of us, this is a normal daily occurrence. However, I did find it difficult to work on a training module, then switch to



some work that needed to get done, then back to find my place in the course material/video. So, if you are attempting to complete the coursework during normal work

hours, going back and forth can be a bit challenging. Consider creating a schedule and informing your co-workers of your class time to avoid too many interruptions.

Even with the difficulties we faced, we are still glad we took the online course. The cost is a fraction of what it costs to go to Nashville for a week. However, a down side is not getting to meet all the others who are also taking the course.

From Evonne: Going beyond the on-line certification, this past year I also had the opportunity to go to the PAUMCS Annual Conference in Chicago. Honestly, I did not know what to expect and I was pleasantly surprised. It was a great opportunity to meet with other administrators from across the states and discuss some things with those that have had similar experiences. You also have the opportunity to meet some of the other students who took the online certification course.

From Donna: I did not have the opportunity to go to Chicago so I missed out on meeting those who might have worked with me on the project and others who may have the same type of job that I do. I thoroughly enjoyed the online discussions, especially the one on finances. I learned quite a bit from those discussions, and I am sure some of my coworkers are not happy with me when I say "No, you really can't do that." I understand all those who completed the course



received their certification and in order to maintain our certification we must:

1. Maintain national membership in the Professional Administrators of The United Methodist Connectional Structure (PAUMCS) with dues current and paid in full for the calendar year.
2. Attend the full session of a PAUMCS National Annual Conference at least once every four (4) years and earn one Continuing Education Unit*.
3. Earn one Continuing Education Unit* in the two-year period by attending:
 - A. the full session of a National Annual Conference of PAUMCS.
 - B. the full session of an approved annual meeting of any local PAUMCS Chapter in good standing.
 - C. an event related to the church secretary's profession with prior approval of the PAUMCS National Professional.

*Definition for Continuing Education Unit (CEU): One CEU is defined as Ten (10) contact hours of participation in an organized continuing education experience under responsible sponsorship, capable direction, and qualified instruction. Business Meetings, Worship Services, breaks, meals, snacks, and fellowship/gathering times are not to be considered. Contact hours of less than 10 but not less than 5 will be granted .5 CEU (Example: an 8-hour workshop/seminar would be equal to .5 CEU.)

The above requirements are needed to maintain your certification as a Certified United Methodist Church Administrator.

Overall, the experience is one that has helped in our day-to-day ministry with the church.

The General Conference on Finance and Administration (GCFA) offers online certification courses for administrative professionals in the United Methodist Church. Check gcf.org/paumcs for the next available course enrollment period!
